Campbell said the kitchen is "really, really excited about how well the fundraising is going this year." As of Monday morning (Feb. 18), just over \$52,000 of the \$75,000 goal had been raised.

Even so, he said he's hoping the community will come out for the "last minute push that everybody gave last year."

The high school challenge is a friendly competition that Campbell hopes could become an annual event. To incentivize the students, co-ordinators have secured local sponsors who will provide a pizza lunch for every student that participates as part of their high school team.

As of Monday morning, Salish Secondary had 15 registered walkers, with a total of \$425 raised. Information for Lord Tweedsmuir was not yet available.
